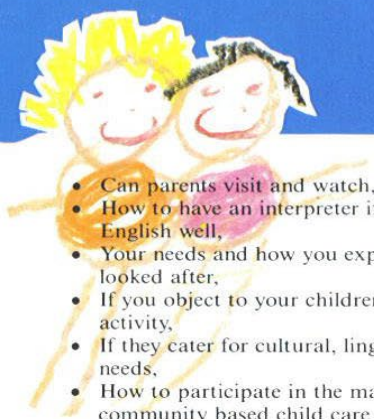




- Can parents visit and watch,

Child Care Programmes in Australia might be different from your home country.

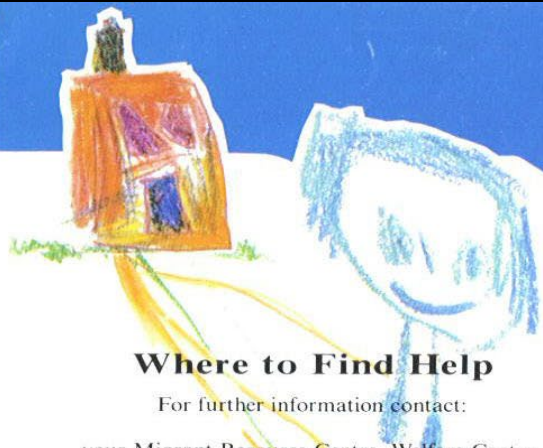
Children develop skills and self discipline through play and activities that include:

- painting, • pasting, • plasticine (play dough),
- puzzles, • blocks, • construction equipment,
- music, • books, • story telling,
- sand and water play and other outdoor activities.

Children learn skills and develop muscle and body co-ordination, using brushes, fingers, hands and feet.

They develop eye and hand co-ordination playing with water.

While playing children develop language skills and increase their concentration.
